Q1: OFFICER LESA BRENEMAN

A1: TIMOTHY BERNAL

Q1: This is Officer Breneman Fort Myers Police Department it is June 19th 2016 at 11:53 p.m. I'm here with Timothy Bernal B-E-R-N-A-L is that correct Sir?

A1: Um hum

Q1: Okay Mr. Bernal as a Law Enforcement Officer in the state of Florida I'm authorized to administer sworn statements. Do you swear that everything you're gonna tell me is the truth the whole truth nothing but the truth?

A1: Yes Ma'am.

Q1: Okay can you tell me what happened were on the corner of Colonial Boulevard and Summerlin right now

A1: I was next to the gentleman on the motorcycle as we were exiting the Dicks Sporting Goods parking lot on Colonial and 41 as we merged onto Colonial from 41 he had gotten around traffic in front of me we had gone up 41 or gone up Colonial as he was progressing his merge into the left lane a full size Dodge Pickup truck was in front of him and he was going around the truck merging into the center lane progressing into the third into the inside lane truck tried to come over at the same time as the motorcycle was what appeared to me from my vantage point from directly behind them was at very close to even to the driver's side door on the truck the truck had started to merge over paused for just a second as they were side by side them progressed over with a swift jerk of the wheel hit the motorcycle and he progressed into the median took out the traffic sign and then hit the tree.

Q1: Okay so you guys are

A1: After that then the truck had slowed down almost as if you know he was going to stop maybe had a slight sense of consciousness there but then as soon as he slowed down he continued on and from what I could tell went through the light at that point from that far down on Colonial I couldn't tell if he went over the midpoint bridge or if he turned on McGregor one way or the other

Q1: okay

A1: but he did progress on Colonial.

Q1: okay so you're westbound on Colonial you see a motorcycle in the left lane the eventually in front of you and the pickup truck was in the middle lane cause Colonial has three lane so the pickup truck was in the middle lane?

A1: The pickup truck was in the far right lane

Q1: Okay

A1: okay and as the motorcycle came up he was getting into the center lane as he was coming up the driver's side rear of the truck then the truck started to merge over as the motorcycle got equal to the driver's side door

Q1: okay

A1: the truck had moved over to the point to where the motorcycle was on or close to the dotted line getting over into the third the inside lane

Q1: okay

A1: at that point then the truck moved over and hit the bike

Q1: and it was a quick movement?

A1: it was quick

Q1: Okay

A1: it was there was no accident I mean he stopped recognized what was next to him and then moved over and knocked him over

Q1: okay and described the pickup truck to me.

A1: the pickup from my vantage point was a full size white Dodge pickup truck 1500 or 2500 with a camper shell on the back.

Q1: Okay

A1: Very well you know could have been silver but from what I could tell

Q1: um hum

A1: was white.

Q1: okay do you think it was a newer model or

A1: new

Q1: older model?

A1: it was a newer truck yeah

Q1: Did you notice anything distinctive about the truck?

A1: no there was like no marking there was no like you know business sign on the back or anything like that it was

Q1: and it wasn't a dooly

A1: no it wasn't a dooly

Q1: it wasn't a dooly truck okay not that big okay

A1: so it was either a 1500 or 2500 Dodge pickup truck full size cause even when we came to look at this Jeep here right stand back and look from as far back as I was

you know this could look like it's got a camper shell on the back

Q1: veah

Al: but no it was a much larger vehicle then it was a full size truck.

Q1: okay full size like a dual cab kind of thing you think?

A1: I was directly behind it you know

Q1: sure

A1: I can't tell if it was a quad cab or if there was an extended cab

Q1: okay

A1: very you know the most popular model in their lineup is their quad cab it could of very well been a crew cab or quad cab

Q1: okay

A1: but I can't from that angel I couldn't tell if it was that long or not.

Q1: so you think the damage on the Dodge would be like the side of it like the driver's door?

A1: oh absolutely

Q1: Okay do you think the front end would be damaged at all?

A1: from what I could see? No

Q1: Okay you think more of the side

A1: from what I could see he was right here

Q1: okay so right adjacent to the driver's window when he merged over and the truck merged over?

A1: yeah

Q1: Okay

A1: because he had come from the rear (UI) here had moved up the truck had moved up to where basically they were this close you know an arm's reach to the truck

Q1: okay

A1: the truck had stopped his progression from merging over at that point and then went one last just jerked and knocked the kid off the road

Q1: when the truck initially passing you did you when you guys were way back

A1: the truck was in front of me

Q1: it was always in front of you?

Al: he was always in front of me.

Q1: Okay

A1: He either got on the road somewhere after 41 he had either got in that intersection just passed the merge getting on Colonial

Q1: okay the light the next light is Deleon it's that big light down there

A1: so he might have gotten on there but I was focusing on the motorcycle because we had just like I said we were merging on to Colonial and he was making his progression over a red truck had just gotten off and turned left on which would be I think that's Deleon where the 7/11 is

Q1: Right yep

A1: right there the red truck had turned off there and the motorcycle had progressed on he was making his merges over everything was smooth until that truck got over there got right next to him and he knew what was going on I'm telling you this was not an accident I mean he moved over everything was smooth until that last jerk and he gave that last jerk knocked the kid off the road and he kept on going.

Q1: did it look like maybe it was a road rage incident before that?

A1: No

Q1: other than the last movement no?

A1: no I mean this kid I followed him like I said I followed him out of the parking lot over there he was coming out

Q1: Okay so they weren't

A1: of the parking lot

Q1: in the same area

A1: he was properly geared he was following all the traffic laws until that point

Q1: okay

A1: if he did anything he was trying to get away from the truck and he might have goosed it once just trying to get away from him

Q1: sure

A1: cause he saw him moving over next to him proper instinct for a motorcycle to do

Q1: right

A1: but as soon as that truck struck him he most likely got him on the handle bar the kid you know grabbed a hand full and

Q1: um hum

A1: and just went straight into the

Q1: what did you do after the traffic accident cause you were back behind it

A1: I was behind him

Q1: okay

A1: so as I saw the bike was still sliding when I stopped so it was

Q1: you stopped right there

A1: there was a it was a bang bang like do I stay with him

Q1: right

A1: or do I follow him?

Q1: right

A1: The truck and I had more concern for the kid

Q1: sure

A1: on the street then that truck at that point so

Q1: sure

A1: I tried to cause everything went straight through it's like I don't have a plate number I'm so

Q1: right

A1: I'm sorry but I was trying to just take mental images at that point it was definitely a full size truck but

Q1: okay

A1: I just half of me wishes I would of just followed him and got more information on that truck.

Q1: and I heard something about maybe a flat tire did you see something

A1: I did not see

Q1: you didn't see anything that would lead you to believe there was a flat tire?

A1: no

Q1: Okay

A1: and like I was even telling them with this if this happened back there (Ui)

Q1: yeah

A1: and you'd see tire tracks on medium

Q1: sure

A1: but no I didn't see a flat tire if anything the damage on that truck is right on this side the motorcycle was (UI) guess you still have it back there but it's a blue and white Yamaha it was either a R6 or a R1

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

On June 19, 2016 at approximately 11:01 pm, Adam Murray Costello, did knowingly commit the following offenses:

- 1. Leaving the Scene of a Traffic Crash Involving Death, in violation of Florida State Statute 316.027(2)(c)
- 2. Tampering with Evidence, in violation of Florida State Statute 918.13(1)(a)

There is probable cause to believe this in that Traffic homicide Investigator Lesa Breneman conducted an investigation and determined the following: On June 19, 2016, Adam Murray Costello was the driver of a motor vehicle and did hit and kill a human being, Adam Roger King. Costello then tampered/concealed/destroyed evidence relating to the crime, knowing that a police investigation had commenced and with the intent to impair the availability of the evidence in the investigation.

The investigation was as follows:

On June 19, 2016 at approximately 2301 hours, the Fort Myers Police Department received a 911 call in reference to a traffic crash that had just occurred on Colonial Blvd near the intersection of Summerlin Rd. The 911 caller was Timothy Bernal.

Officer Michael Perry was the first officer on scene and observed a motorcycle, Florida tag 14BNK, lying the eastbound lane 1 of Colonial Blvd. Officer Perry also observed the motorcycle operator lying on the grass median adjacent to a tree. The motorcycle operator was still wearing a helmet and was lifeless. Lee County Emergency Medical Services arrived on scene and pronounced the motorcyclist deceased at 2310

hours. Officer Perry noted that there were no other vehicles at the scene of the crash except the one belonging to the witness Bernal.

Traffic Homicide Investigators Lesa Breneman and Gustavo Goncalves were contacted and responded to the scene. The deceased motorcyclist was identified as Adam Roger King (07/21/1997).

Officer Goncalves photographed and measured the crash scene and Officer Breneman spoke with Bernal. Officer Breneman got a sworn taped statement from Bernal. Bernal advised the following: He was westbound on Colonial Blvd from Cleveland Ave. Bernal was travelling behind King on his motorcycle. Bernal observed a white pickup truck turn onto Colonial Blvd in front of him, possibly from the light at Deleon St. Bernal then observed the white pickup truck change from lane 2 suddenly into lane 1 and strike King. Bernal watched King drive up onto the median and strike the tree. Bernal noted the white pickup truck continued westbound after striking King, without stopping at any point to render aid or provide driver's information. Bernal stopped his vehicle near where King came to final rest and prepared to provide medical aid to King. Bernal noted the pickup truck continued toward the Midpoint Bridge/McGregor Blvd area but he could not confirm which direction the truck went from there. Bernal described the pickup truck which struck King and fled as white in color, newer model, with a topper on the bed of the truck. Bernal stated that damage to the truck would be to the front driver's door and fender.

Officer Breneman then spoke with Shame Romero. Romero provided a taped sworn statement. Romero was another witness to the crash. Romero stated that he was westbound on Colonial Blvd next to a white pickup truck. The pickup truck swerved into Romero's lane. Romero then watched the pickup truck change lanes into lane 1, where the motorcyclist was, and strike the motorcyclist. Romero observed the white pickup truck continue westbound on Colonial Blvd towards the Midpoint Bridge/McGregor Blvd intersection. Romero made a U-turn right after the crash and returned to where King lay at final rest to provide medical aid. Romero passed the white pickup truck going in the opposite direction. Romero believed the pickup truck had a flat front driver's side tire. Romero advised that damage to the white pickup truck would be to the driver's door area. Romero also believed that he observed a topped on the bed of the pickup truck.

Officer Breneman and Officer Goncalves surveyed the scene of the crash and located a left front tire mud flap. The part number on the mud flap belonged to a Toyota. Officer Breneman then located a driver's side heated outside glass mirror and a black plastic shell of the driver's side mirror amidst the crash debris. The part numbers on the glass and the shell of the outside mirror were consistent with a Toyota. Officer Breneman collected the mud flap and mirror and plastic shell piece as evidence.

Adam King was transferred to the Medical Examiner's Office. Pam Strassel was the Medical Examiner Investigator.

On June 21, 2016 at 0717 hours, attorney Scott Moorey contacted the Fort Myers Police Department to advise that he represents Adam Costello, later identified as Adam Murray Costello (11/12/1974). Moorey further advised that the white pickup truck involved in the fatal car crash on June 19, 2016 is registered to Adam Costello and Moorey stated that the pickup truck was located at 3912 Arlington St, Fort Myers, FL. Moorey additionally notified the call taker that Costello has invoked his right to an attorney and advised law enforcement to not speak to Costello without him present.

Officer David Gaide responded to 3912 Arlington St and observed a white 2015 Toyota Tundra, bearing Florida tag 006RDK, in the front yard of the residence. The registered owner of the 2015 Toyota Tundra was Adam Costello. Officer Goncalves responded to Arlington St and observed the Toyota had extensive driver's side door and fender damage and was missing the driver's side outside mirror, consistent with the outside driver's side mirror parts located at the crash scene. The Toyota also had blue paint transfer on the driver's side, consistent with striking King's motorcycle which is royal blue in color. The Toyota was backed into the front yard of 3912 Arlington St adjacent to the wooden fence gate. A boat was on the other side of the fence in the back yard.

Moorey and Costello met with Officer Goncalves at 3912 Arlington St. Costello signed a Consent to Search Form for the Toyota Tundra. Moorey signed the consent form as a witness. The consent form granted Officer Goncalves permission to remove the Toyota from the front yard of the residence and search the exterior and interior of the Toyota. The house at 3912 Arlington St is owned by Susan Costello, whom Moorey identified as Costello's mother. Officer Breneman confirmed via Lee County Property Appraisals website that the parcel, 3912 Arlington St, is in fact owned by Susan Costello. The Toyota was towed to the Fort Myers Police Impound lot.

The Fort Myers Police Department did not receive any stolen vehicle reports for a white pickup truck from June 18, 2016-June 21, 2016 and more specifically did not receive a stolen vehicle report from Adam Costello for his white 2015 Toyota Tundra.

On June 22, 2016, Detective Charles Newell completed a CLEAR report on Adam Costello which identified Costello's cellular phone number as 239-218-4928. Additionally, The CLEAR report identified Costello's home and business address as 3912 Arlington St.

On June 22, 2016, Officer Breneman authored and received a search warrant from Judge Josephine Gagliardi for Costello's Verizon cellular phone data and records (239-218-4928). Officer Breneman electronically sent the warrant to Verizon Wireless.

On June 22, 2016, Officer Breneman interviewed Gordon Durant via telephone. Durant advised that he has known Costello and Daniel Sinclair, aka James Daniel Sinclair, since he was younger and grew up with them. Durant was raised in the Fort Myers area. Durant advised that on June 19, 2016, Daniel Sinclair posted on his Facebook page that he was at Twin Peaks, a restaurant and bar in Fort Myers, with Adam Costello drinking beer. The Facebook post was at 1423 hours on June 19, 2016. Durant saw the Facebook post himself on his cellular phone. Durant stated that the post was then altered to remove Costello's name from the post as Costello had deleted his Facebook page. Durant further advised that Costello is a heavy alcohol drinker. He also advised that Costello is always on his cellular phone and has it with him at all times. Durant works in air conditioning and knows that Costello lives on Arlington St and has for at least three years. Durant has done work at Costello's Arlington St house before. Durant is also familiar with Costello's white Toyota Tundra which he stated Costello has owned for one and a half to two years. Durant advised that he has never seen anyone else drive Costello's vehicles as long as he has known him. Durant has not spoken with Costello since January 2016. Durant believes that Costello was driving the Toyota the night of the crash and was likely drinking alcohol and believes that Sinclair will not cooperate with the police and will cover for Costello. Durant provided Sinclair's cellular phone number as 239-634-7877.

Deputy Sommers, with the assistance of Officer Breneman, seized the items relating to the search warrant as evidence. Deputy Sommers transferred custody of the evidentiary items to Officer Breneman. A copy of the search warrant and return was left with Sinclair by Deputy Sommers.

On July 18, 2016, Officer Breneman met with Jacquelyn Levine. Levine provided a sworn taped statement. Levine advised that she spoke with Sinclair via telephone on June 23, 2016 around 1730 hours. The phone conversation was prompted by Levine asking Sinclair about the news story that Levine had seen with Sinclair mentioned. Sinclair then called Levine and told her that he could not tell her who was driving the vehicle that killed Adam King because "it would be incriminating". Levine has not spoken to Sinclair since that date.

On July 18, 2016, Officer Breneman interviewed David Levin again. Levin advised that he spoke with Sinclair via telephone on July 14, 2016 at approximately 0957 hours. Sinclair called Levin. Sinclair again told Levin that he gave the 'DVR' for the home surveillance footage to Costello. Sinclair stated "I gave it to him". Sinclair also advised Levin that he had already told his attorney about the 'DVR' and he didn't do anything wrong so the 'DVR' isn't worth mentioning. Sinclair also told Levin not to cooperate with the police; cooperation doesn't help because it didn't help in Levin's case. This phone call took place several hours before the search warrant was served on Sinclair's house where it was determined that the 'DVR' for his home surveillance system was missing.

On July 21, 2016, Officer Breneman met with Kelly Andriano and Andrew Kempel of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, FDLE. Andriano is an analyst who specializes in phone record GPS/RTT data. Andriano analyzed Costello's Verizon phone records, 239-218-4928. Andriano observed that Costello made a phone call at 2253 hours on June 19, 2016 to 239-707-5561 which lasted 482 seconds. Andriano was able to track the starting cell tower for that call which placed Costello's phone near Plantation Rd travelling in a northern direction. The phone call ended on a cell tower placing the phone on the east side of the tower near Colonial Blvd and Summerlin Rd. The next two cell towers which Costello's phone ping off of are consistent with him travelling to Arlington St. The most direct route from Sinclair's house on Dabney St to Costello's house on Arlington St is via Plantation Rd north to Colonial Blvd then west to McGregor Blvd then north towards Arlington St. The cell phone analysis performed by Andriano is consistent with Costello's phone travelling that route. Andriano completed a report on her findings as they pertain to Costello's cellular phone.

On July 22, 2016, Officer Breneman met with Joshua Jackson. Jackson is the subscriber of cell phone number 239-707-5561. Jackson confirmed that he spoke with Costello on June 19, 2016 at 2253 hours. Jackson had a copy of his phone records. Jackson could not remember the exact content of the conversation that he had with Costello at that time but he was certain that he had spoken with Costello at phone number 239-218-4928 at that time which puts Costello in possession of his cell phone on June 19, 2016 from 2253-2301 hours. Jackson stated that he has personally never seen anyone but Costello drive Costello's Toyota Tundra.

On July 21, 2016, Officer Breneman met with Maria Michelle Newhard. Newhard advised that she had been casually dating Costello recently. Newhard stated that she spoke with Costello on June 19 and 20, 2016 but the calls were relating to her dying father. Newhard showed Officer Breneman the text messages on her phone between her and Costello which confirmed that the majority of the conversation was in reference to Newhard's father or just casual conversation. Costello did send one message to Newhard on

- 2. Clear nonmetallic finishcoat
- 3. Dark blue finishcoat with decorative flake

These scrapings exhibit characteristics consistent with an automotive paint layer system.

Agency Exhibit 29 consists of white multilayered paint scrapings that, upon examination, have what initially appeared to be a blue transfer material on their surface. However, further microscopical examinations revealed that the blue areas on these scrapings are not transferred paint, but rather what appears to be blue pigment that is embedded inside the clear topcoat layer of the scrapings. Also observed on the clear topcoat layer of one of these scrapings is smeared grey plastic. Since no transferred automotive paint was found on any of the scrapings collected from the Toyota Tundra pickup truck, no comparative examinations were performed.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION:

The body is that of a lean, well-developed, well-kempt, 72-inch, 173-pound, white man whose appearance is consistent with the recorded age of 18 years. The decedent is clad in the following items of clothing:

- 1. A damaged black helmet
- 2. A black "Icon" brand, Stryker protective vest
- 3. A pair of black "Icon" gloves
- 4. A pair of black athletic anklet socks
- 5. A "Swiss Gear" brand brown-black leather belt received in two separate pieces
- 6. A pair of "Wrangler" denim jeans, size 34 x 32
- 7. A long-sleeved, black "Under Armour" brand shirt.

Retrieved from the right front pocket of the jeans is a "Samsung" cellular telephone with an overlying "Otter" cover. Retrieved from the right rear pocket of the jeans is a trifold, black wallet. Identified within the wallet is a Florida driver's license, class "E", of Adam Roger King with a license number of K520-016-97-261-0. Retrieved from the right front pocket of the jeans is a set of white earbuds and remnants of an electronic cigarette with multiple pieces of broken glass. Encircling the left wrist is a green rubber bracelet.

Examination of the shirt reveals multiple defects in the material identified on both the left back side of the shirt as well as the right sleeve of the shirt. Examination of the jeans reveals multiple tears of the denim material over the right knee area as well as over the left anterolateral thigh area.

Rigor mortis is present. Lividity is posterior, patchy, pink-purple, non-blanching, and spares areas exposed to pressure. The scalp is covered with coarse, wavy, light brown to red hair measuring approximately 1 1/2 inches in length on top. The irides are blue-gray. conjunctivae are clear and free of petechiae. The sclerae are not congested or edematous. The nares are patent. The nose has no palpable fractures. Curly red to light brown hair is present on the lateral sides of the face, superior to the upper lip, and over the central chin area. The oral cavity is patent and has upper and lower natural dentition in fair repair. The frenula are grossly free of injuries. No lingual mucosal lacerations are identified. The neck is grossly straight. Identified on the central thorax and abdomen is light brown hair. The pubic hair is light brown. The penis is circumcised and the testes are descended, bilaterally. The external genitalia is grossly free of trauma. The back is straight. The left buttock, superior to the inferior gluteal fold, has two well-healed, vertically oriented linear scars. The lower extremities have no identifiable scars or tattoos. There is no palpable pretibial edema of either lower extremity. Examination of the antecubital fossae, bilaterally, reveals no identifiable recreational intravenous puncture sites or appreciable track marks. The dorsal surface of the right forearm has a monochromatic, professional tattoo of an eagle. The ventral aspect of the right forearm has a

monochromatic, professional tattoo of a rose and an adjacent sword. The fingernails of both hands are focally unkempt. The lateral aspect of the left hand, adjacent to the 5th digit, has a discontiguous area of dark black to dark blue discoloration which extends onto the left 5th digit. (This coloration may be due to the overlying glove at the time of the injury.) There is no evidence of acute traumatic penetrating or sharp force injury.

IDENTIFICATION:

The decedent is identified by visual comparison to driver's license by Investigator Pam Strassel on scene.

EVIDENCE OF MEDICAL THERAPY:

None.

EVIDENCE OF ACUTE BLUNT TRAUMA:

Identified on the anterolateral aspect of the left side of the head, within the parietal area, is a 3.1-cm laceration. Multiple small red abrasions are identified on the bridge of the nose. Present on the nose are multiple small confluent abrasions and lacerations. Reflection of the scalp reveals focally dense subscalp and subgaleal hemorrhages at the vertex of the head and over the left temporaparietal areas. Examination of the cranium reveals multiple contiguous, focally depressed fractures of the left parietal bone with continuation of fractures into the left temporal bone. Within the cranial cavity, there is an estimated 4 cc of clotted, dark red subdural blood present at the base of the brain. The brain is extremely edematous with flattening of the gyri and narrowing of the sulci. Multiple thin subarachnoid hemorrhages are present on the cerebral convexities, bilaterally. Examination of the base of the skull reveals multiple fractures of the bilateral anterior cranial fossae, the bilateral middle cranial fossae, and the posterior cranial fossa.

Externally, the anterior aspect of the neck and undersurface of the chin have multiple small irregular abrasions.

Externally, the right lateral thorax has a cluster of multiple slightly parallel, linear, horizontally oriented abrasions which extend from the right axilla to the right upper abdomen. These abrasions measure up to 15 cm in total dimension. Present over the central anterior abdomen are multiple irregular small abrasions. Identified on the left anterolateral thorax, inferior to the axilla, are two irregular abrasions measuring up to 2.1 cm in greatest dimension. Internally, within the thoracic cavity, the anterior aspect of rib 2 on the right side has a displaced rib fracture. The lateral aspects of ribs 1 and 5 on the right side and the posterior aspects of ribs 1, 3, 4, and 5-12 on the right side have displaced and nondisplaced rib fractures with focal surrounding intercostal muscular hemorrhages. Multiple fractured ribs protrude into the right pleural cavity. The anterior aspects of ribs 2 and 3 on the left side have displaced rib fractures. The lateral aspects of 1 and 5-8 on the left side have displaced and nondisplaced rib fractures

associated with protrusion of rib fragments into the left pleural cavity. The posterior aspects of ribs 2, 3, 5, and 6-12 have displaced rib fractures associated with surrounding intercostal muscular hemorrhages. The pericardial sac is lacerated. Identified on the anterior aspect of the right ventricle is a diagonally oriented 4.2-cm laceration. The right atrium and right atrial appendage are also lacerated. The thoracic aorta, near the origin, has an irregular linear laceration. Both lungs have prominent contusions and lacerations. The hilar aspects of both lungs have prominent confluent, larger lacerations. The right pleural cavity contains a measured 100 cc of clotted and unclotted, dark red blood. The left pleural cavity has an estimated 60 cc of clotted and unclotted, dark red blood. The thoracic vertebral column has multiple fractures of the 5th-8th vertebral bodies with traumatic dislocation of the vertebral structures in this area. Exposed is a lacerated, focally macerated thoracic spinal cord.

Externally, the abdomen has multiple irregular abrasions and small punctate abrasions. Identified on the anterolateral aspect of the abdomen is a cluster of large coalescing abrasions which measure up to 16 cm in total dimension. Identified on the central lower back, superior to the midline of the buttocks, is an irregular 2.2-cm abrasion. Identified within the abdominal cavity is a lacerated left hemidiaphragm. This defect is associated with a traumatic hemiation of the stomach into the left pleural cavity. The right hemidiaphragm has multiple contusions and lacerations. The spleen has multiple capsular and parenchymal lacerations and is associated with an estimated 100 cc of clotted, dark red blood around that organ. The posterior aspect of the right lobe of the liver has a 7.2-cm laceration adjacent to surrounding hemorrhage of the porta hepatis. The right adrenal gland is lacerated. The right kidney is completely bi-valved and has a jagged appearance. The left kidney is pale tan, and the hilar aspects have multiple confluent lacerations which involve the renal artery and renal vein. Multiple mesenteric hemorrhages are identified throughout the large and small intestines. Examination of the serosal aspect of the cecum reveals multifocal hemorrhages without underlying defects of the intestine. The psoas major muscles, bilaterally, are completely avulsed from the normal anatomic location and overlie displaced bilateral sacroiliac fractures. Multiple fractures of the ilium, ischium, and pubic symphysis are appreciated. The tissues adjacent to the abdominal aorta are hemorrhagic.

Externally, the anterior aspect of the left thigh has a large, pale blue, subtle ecchymosis associated with multiple small abrasions and ecchymosis and lacerations. Present over the right knee is an ovoid, 2.2-cm red-pink laceration without associated underlying palpable skeletal deformity. Adjacent to this laceration are multiple small dried red-brown abrasions measuring up to 2.5 cm. Both pretibial regions have irregular pink-purple to purple-brown ecchymoses measuring up to 3.6 cm in total dimension.

Externally, the dorsal surface of the left forearm has multiple small, dried red-brown abrasions measuring up to 0.5 cm in greatest dimension. Similar abrasions are identified on the dorsal surface of the left hand. The dorsal surface of the left 3rd digit has two small irregular lacerations. The dorsal surface of the right forearm has multiple confluent, linear abrasions measuring up to 11.1 cm in total dimension.

EVIDENCE OF RECENT, HEALING BLUNT TRAUMATIC INJURY:

Identified on the anterior aspect of the left thigh, superior to the knee, are two small, circular, yellow-orange ecchymoses measuring up to 0.7 cm in total dimension. Inferior and medial to the left knee are two separate, green-yellow, healing ecchymoses measuring up to 2.9 cm. Identified on the right lower extremity, over the calf and pretibial region, are three healing, green-yellow ecchymoses measuring up to 3.2 cm in greatest dimension.

INTERNAL EXAMINATION:

The tissues underlying the scalp have the previously described injuries, as does the cranium. The right temporoparietalis muscles are grossly free of trauma. The right side of the cranium is grossly free of fractures. Internally, within the cranial cavity, the 1480-gram brain has the previously described injuries. No epidural blood accumulations are identified. The cerebral hemispheres are edematous with flattened gyri and narrowed sulci. The cerebellar lobes are symmetrical and edematous. The vessels at the base of the brain are grossly unremarkable and have no appreciable aneurysms, atherosclerotic disease, or identifiable injuries. Internal examination of the brain matter reveals no identifiable infarcts, masses, hemorrhages, or evidence of diffuse axonal injury. Examination of the basilar skull reveals the previously described fractures. The pituitary gland is intact and free of trauma.

The tongue has no evidence of hemorrhages. The hyoid bone, thyroid gland, thyroid cartilage, larynx, and muscles of the anterior neck have no evidence of disease or injury. The laryngeal cavity is patent and free of foreign matter.

Remnants of the thymus gland are identified and tan-pink.

The serosal cavities have no unusual odors. The clavicles, sternum, cervical and lumbar vertebral column have no identifiable fractures. The ribs are not osteoporotic. The exposed bone marrow is grossly unremarkable.

The pericardial sac and heart have the previously described injuries. The 320-gram heart has a smooth, glistening epicardial surface in uninjured areas. The heart is associated with a normal amount of subepicardial fat. The coronary arteries appear to be right-dominant, but the majority of the right coronary artery is destroyed except for the posterior ventricular branch. The atria and ventricles are grossly unremarkable except for the previously described traumatic injuries. No septal defects are identified. The cardiac valves are grossly free of vegetations, malformations, or injuries. The myocardium is red-brown throughout. The root of the aorta is grossly without trauma. The ostia are patent.

The 340-gram right lung and 310-gram left lung have the previously described injuries. Both lungs have a pink-red appearance. No interlobar or parietal pleural adhesions are identified. The lymph nodes of the hilar areas are not appreciated. Bloody fluid is identified within the airways of both lungs. The pulmonary vessels are patent and free of atherosclerotic plaques. The lower

lobes of both lungs have a patchy, hemorrhagic pattern of hemorrhage with a harlequin-type pattern (consistent with hemoaspiration). There is no gross evidence of antemortem mucous plugging, tumor, consolidation, or identifiable granulomatous disease.

The abdominal panniculus measures approximately 1/2 inch in thickness. The hemidiaphragms have the previously described injuries. The 1380-gram liver has a smooth, glistening, intact capsule in uninjured areas. The gallbladder is present and contains an estimated 7 cc of thin, orange bile and is free of gallstones. The cut hepatic surfaces are minimally congested, red-brown, and firm. No intrahepatic masses are identified.

The 170-gram spleen has the previously described injuries. The intact remnants of the capsule are gray and smooth. The left adrenal gland is grossly unremarkable. The pancreas is lobular and pink-tan throughout its course and has no gross evidence of antemortem hemorrhage or fat necrosis.

The 110-gram right kidney and 120-gram left kidney have the previously described injuries. The left kidney is pale in comparison to the right kidney. The corticomedullary demarcations appear normal in uninjured areas. The urinary bladder contains an estimated 75 cc of clear, yellow urine. The urinary bladder is grossly free of trauma. The prostate gland is small and has no evidence of injury. The testicles and seminal vesicles are grossly free of trauma.

The stomach contains an estimated 200 cc of partially masticated blueberries, intact blueberries, and fragments of pink-tan, firm material. No intact pill matter is identified within the gastric contents. The esophagus is unremarkable. The mucosa of the stomach has normal rugae with a pink-purple discoloration of the mucosa. No ulcers are identified. The appendix is present. The large and small intestines have the previously described injuries and are otherwise unremarkable along their serosal surfaces.

The central cardiovascular tree is devoid of blood. The thoracic and lumbar aortae have the previously described injury.

Adam Murray Costello appeals the order summarily denying his motion for postconviction relief filed pursuant to Florida Rule of Criminal Procedure 3.850. We reverse with instructions for the postconviction court to strike the motion with leave for M₂. Costello to amend.

Mr. Costello was charged with leaving the scene of a crash resulting in death (count one), a first-degree felony punishable by thirty years' imprisonment, and tampering with physical evidence (count two), a third-degree felony punishable by five years' imprisonment. He pleaded nolo contendere pursuant to a negotiated plea agreement and was sentenced to concurrent sentences of ten and a half years' imprisonment with a four-year minimum mandatory

term on count one and five years' imprisonment on count two.

Mr. Costello claimed that his trial counsel provided ineffective assistance by failing to note that victim injury points had been improperly included in his Criminal Punishment Code scoresheet and by affirmatively misadvising him as to the lowest permissible sentence he could receive if found guilty at trial. He asserted that counsel misadvised him that the lowest permissible sentence was 126.3 months' imprisonment when it should have been 36.3 months. He argued that victim injury points are only proper when the underlying offense caused the victim injury and that his scoresheet improperly assessed 120 victim injury points when there was no evidence that the victim died because he fled the scene of the accident. He asked the court to vacate his sentence.

The postconviction court summarily denied the claim on the merits, finding that the claim was conclusively refuted by the record because victim injury points were appropriate. See Fla. R. Crim. P. 3.704(d)(9) (stating that victim injury points are scored when there is "physical injury or death suffered by a person as a direct result of any offense pending before the court for sentencing"); Sims v. State, 998 So. 2d 494, 506-07 (Fla. 2008) (holding that victim injury points are properly assessed when the evidence indicates that the victim's death was a direct result of the underlying offense of fleeing the scene of a crash resulting in death).

An error in the scoresheet could render a plea involuntary where the defendant shows that the sentence pled to was based on the minimum permissible sentence according to the erroneous scoresheet calculation and that the defendant would not have entered into the plea if he or she would have been aware of the correct sentencing range. Wright v. State, 174 So. 3d 400, 402 (Fla. 4th DCA2015) (emphasis added) (citing Towery v. State, 977 So. 2d 774, 775-76 (Fla. 2d DCA2008)).

Mr. Costello's claim as to the improper inclusion of victim injury points is not conclusively refuted by the record or the postconviction court's order. The court did not include any attachments refuting the claim, and the record does not include any information regarding the victim's cause of death.1 See Harrell v. State, 79 So. 3d 231, 232 (Fla. 2d DCA2012).

However, Mr. Costello's claim is facially insufficient because it does not include a request to withdraw his plea. See Agent v. State, 19 So. 3d 1114, 1115 (Fla. 2d DCA2009) ("[O]ur review of

the record also indicates that Agent's rule 3.850 motion {330 So. 3d 1054} was facially insufficient because it does not include an affirmative request to withdraw the plea."). Rather, Mr. Costello merely requested that the postconviction court vacate his sentence and resentence him using a corrected scoresheet. That is impermissible. See Johnson v. State, 60 So. 3d 1045, 1052 (Fla. 2011) ("[A] defendant who establishes that his plea was entered involuntarily is entitled to withdraw the plea but not to unilaterally rewrite the plea agreement to his advantage.").

Accordingly, we reverse the summary denial of Mr. Costello's rule 3.850 motion and remand the case to the postconviction court with instructions to strike the motion with leave to amend. See Fla. R. Crim. P. 3.850(f)(2). On remand, if Mr. Costello chooses to amend his motion and seeks to withdraw his plea, the postconviction court shall either attach those portions of the record that conclusively refute Mr. Costello's claim or conduct an evidentiary hearing.

Reversed and remanded.

PROCEDURAL POSTURE: The Fifth District Court of Anneal (Florida) entered a judgment that affirmed the trial court's imposition of victim-injury points in a case where defendant was convicted of leaving the scene of an accident resulting in death in violation of 316.027(1)(b), Fla. Stat. (2001). After the state supreme court denied defendant's motion to invoke discretionary review, it granted his motion for reinstatement to review the appellate court's decision. Victim-injury points were not properly imposed where defendant was convicted of leaving scene of an accident resulting in death in violation of 316.027(1)(b), Fla. Stat.; under 921.0021(7)(a), Fla. Stat., injury had to be "direct result" of offense for such points to be imposed and victim's death was not direct result of defendant's offense.

OVERVIEW: Defendant was driving a vehicle that struck the victim, who was intoxicated and lying in the road. Defendant then drove away. He was charged with violating 316.027(1)(b), Fla. Stat. (2001), leaving the scene of an accident resulting in death. A medical examiner testified that the victim's death was "instantaneous" upon impact. Defendant was convicted. At sentencing, the State successfully argued for adding victim-injury points, which increased his sentence. The appellate court affirmed. Defendant was not informed by his stateappointed appellate counsel about the appellate court's decision until it was too late to file a notice to invoke jurisdiction under Fla. R. App. 9.120(b). The state supreme court then granted defendant's motion for reinstatement. It found that it could treat his belated notice as timely filed because his

Charge involving causation of the death of anybody.

ORDER DENYING DEFENDANT'S RULE 3.850 AMENDED MOTION AFTER EVIDENTIARY HEARING

THIS CAUSE came before the Court for hearing on February 14, 2023, on Defendant's amended motion titled "Motion To Withdraw Plea Based Upon Ineffective Assistance Of Counsel," pursuant to Fla. R. Crim. P. 3.850, filed by counsel March 3, 2022. Having reviewed the motion, the State's response, Defendant's reply, the case file, the applicable law, and considered evidence and argument presented at the hearing, the Court makes the following findings of fact and reaches the following conclusions of law:

Procedural History

- Defendant was arrested on September 2, 2016, pursuant to an Amended Warrant to Arrest charging him with Leaving the Scene of a Traffic Crash Involving Death and Tampering with Evidence, crimes arising from a traffic crash that occurred in Fort Myers, Lee County, Florida, on June 19, 2016. Sec Arrest Warrant and supporting affidavit, attached hereto as Court Exhibit A. Defendant was subsequently formally charged with those crimes. See 4th Amended Information attached hereto as Court Exhibit B.
- 2. Defendant pled 'no contest' pursuant to a negotiated plea agreement with the State, which was formally accepted by the Court at a hearing on March 12, 2018. The plea agreement specified that the maximum sentence for count one was 30 years in prison and for count two was

affidavit in the court file, as well as evidence taken by the Court at various evidentiary hearings throughout the pendency of the action. *Id.* at pp. 22-23.

26. Defendant testified that if he'd known the lowest permissible guidelines sentence was less than 10.5 years he never would have entered a plea. Defendant agreed to the deal because he understood he likely fould not do better at sentencing after a conviction at trial.

Analysis and Conclusions

- 27. In addition to arguing that the holding in Sims precluded assessment of victim injury points in this case, Defendant's postconviction counsel argues that the sentencing scoresheet was in error because there was no record evidence to support the inclusion of those points. Counsel is correct that there was no record evidence regarding causation presented at the sentencing hearing (and, of course, no jury finding based on this evidence). However, the Defendant agreed to inclusion of the points as part of the plea bargain in this case. As Mr. McFee credibly testified, the victim injury points were an issue throughout the case and Mr. McFee tried, but failed, to negotiate a sentence based on a scoresheet that did not include those points.
- 28. Mr. McFee's unrebutted credible testimony at the February 14, 2023, hearing is that, if the Defendant went to trial and was convicted, the evidence would support a finding that the Defendant caused injury or death to the victim. Therefore, Mr. McFee told the Defendant that the 120 points for victim injury were properly included on the scoreshee! The Defendant has not shown that this advice was erroneous. Accordingly, the Defendant has failed to show that his plear was based on misadvice of counsel.

⁶ This testimony assumes that victim injury points should not have been included on the scoresheet to increase the lowest permissible guidelines sentence, as argued by Defendant's postconviction counsel error ously believing that Sims controlled.

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29. Defendant has also failed to show that he would not have entered into the plea agreement if he had understood that the victim injury points were not required by law to be included by the judge at sentencing after a conviction at trial. Mr. McFee thoroughly discussed the victim injury points with the Defendant. Defendant testified that he agreed to the 10.5 year plea offer because he understood he likely could not do better at sentencing after a conviction at trial. He has not shown that this was a misunderstanding.

Accordingly, it is

ORDERED and ADJUDGED that the Defendant's amended 3.850 motion filed March 3, 2022, is DENIED. This is a final order. The Defendant has the right to appeal within 30 days of the rendition of this order.

If Defendant remains in the Lee County jail pursuant to the order for transport for the February 14, 2023, hearing, he shall be returned to the custody of the Department of Corrections forthwith.
